
Butte Paper Dies: Betrayed Workers and Went the Way of All Flesh

Butte, Montana.— The *Butte Bulletin*, a weekly paper published by the labor unions of Silver Bow County and Butte, has announced its indefinite suspension because of financial difficulties.

A statement to the public reads: “Present revenues are insufficient to meet necessary expenses incident to publication. The support which we have received from the workers, loyal and generous though it has been, has been so beaten down by the ravages of unemployment and adverse conditions that our body of militant supporters is now too small to afford the luxury of a newspaper.”

The *Bulletin* was established as a daily about four years ago, with William F Dunne as editor, and later with the assistance of Jack Carney. The paper suspended about a year ago and resumed as a weekly. During its career the policy oscillated between Communism, with bitter antagonism to the Socialist Party, and support of the Democratic Party, Dunne appearing on the Democratic ticket several times as a candidate.

Dunne is now reported in New York working for the Workers Party, until lately the Communist Party.
